

REPORT FROM OUCH(UK)'S VICE CHAIRMAN

OUCH(UK) has had another eventful year – starting in March, we had another successful Cluster Headache Awareness Day, held on 21st March, with coverage in the press and on TV. We had CH awareness events at the House of Commons and The Walton Centre, Liverpool. Cluster headache then made the national BBC news on Breakfast and Radio 5 Live in May. We also had presence at the EHA awareness events. These events generated huge response on the helpline and across social media.

Fundraising efforts from our membership included canoeing the equivalent distance of climbing Everest, the London Marathon, the Great North Run, the wonderful Dobson family running, walking, and cycling 500 miles (the adults) and 200 miles (the children), a climb of Kilimanjaro (Christmas 2016), coffee evenings, Dragon's Den challenges, head-shaves, making and selling of donuts, and donations from all types of groups, including dancers and bell-ringers.

July saw a sell-out attendance of our London conference at St Bartholomew's Hospital. It was the first time visiting this venue. Mike Pollock's family were there to see the first presentation of the Mike Pollock Award, given to sufferer Darren Hamilton. Overseas, OUCH(UK) had representation at the International Headache Society annual conference in Canada.

Next year it is hoped OUCH(UK) will host meetings in the North-East and South-West of the UK. Details will appear online, by email, and in future editions of CHit CHat as soon as our plans are confirmed.

Sadly, in early November, we had the sad news that Carolyn Matheson had passed away suddenly. Carolyn had been a member of OUCH(UK) for many years, and had worked for sometime as a volunteer on our helpline with great compassion and understanding. A sufferer herself, her first concern was always the other person. Her grace, dignity, and great sense of humour will be missed. We send our heartfelt sympathy to her family.

Advice on benefits and employment issues are now outsourced to The Brain Charity in Liverpool. Anyone is free to contact them but OUCH(UK) members are prioritised by The Brain Charity. OUCH(UK)'S BOARD MEETING

At the board meeting of OUCH(UK) trustees (October 2017), arrangements were set out for a meeting next year, and we are hopeful to run the first meeting in the North-East of England. The management of member subscriptions and member benefits were discussed and plans are in hand to introduce monthly membership fees, as well as the current annual membership, and more transparency when it comes to the benefits of being a paid OUCH(UK) member. We are working towards automated reminders to

our members for overdue subscriptions. The new arrangements will be announced in due course. We are also working hard to establish ways to involve our membership more in charity decisions and direction. Compliance with the data protection act was also discussed.

Due to consistent interest, OUCH(UK) window stickers will become available within the next few months. OUCH(UK) charity Christmas card designs were selected, and arrangements made to make them available for members to buy at our next meeting and online.

Various helpline matters were discussed, and two topics were established as the main reasons our callers contact the helpline: applications for PIP and employment benefits, and difficulty with obtaining correct medications or referrals from GPs to headache specialist neurologists. Many callers are not OUCH(UK) members, but are sufferers and they are referred to OUCH(UK) information on both items. We advise our callers on who to contact for advocacy with regards to benefits, and how and who to ask for regarding referrals to headache neurologists.

OUCH(UK) has had contact from health professionals at general hospitals regarding the supply of high flow oxygen. Most often their patient base covers more than one oxygen supplier area, and arrangements for the provision of a part-completed HOOF form, to be given to the patient to take to their own GP and ask them to complete the surgery details and the patient details so the HOOF is received in the area in which the patient lives.

OUCH(UK) CHRISTMAS CARDS

We had some beautiful Christmas cards on sale this year, with all proceeds going to help our charity keep running. The two designs were chosen by the trustees and include a beautiful highland cow and the wonderfully snowy scene of Whitburn Windmill. The cards were onsale at the King's College London conference and via our website, and due to overwhelming demand, they sold out in record time! Keep an eye out in Autumn 2018 for the next batch of OUCH(UK) Christmas cards!

I've been an Oxygen Man for 3 years. I love my job but sometimes it can be frustrating. I always remember the first person I witnessed suffering a cluster headache. It was a young mum with two young kids and a husband who looked totally perplexed and out of his depth. "Bang my eye" she said. He banged above her eye. "Harder" she pleaded. He banged hard above her eye. She turned to me and said, "I'm sorry. It seems to help". I'd experienced a heck of a lot in 32 years of policing, dealing with fatal road accidents, suicide and murder, so I should have been prepared...but I wasn't.

I kept calm and installed the equipment and trained them both how to use it. That incident had a profound effect on me, and it made me want to learn as much as I could about cluster headaches.

I found OUCH(UK) and started to feel confident enough to promote the charity whenever I could. If anyone said they were in nursing or were a doctor, I would say "tell me what you know about cluster headaches"?

I was passionate about 'spreading the word' about OUCH(UK) before I attended their summer conference, but even more motivated after it. The speakers were informative and motivational, as well as the attendees. The two guys I had lunch with were great. I felt a fraud as a 'non-sufferer' but everyone made me feel so welcome.

To receive the Les Charlton Award was something special. It has pride of place in our office. Thank you OUCH(UK) for my lovely award. I'll accept it for all the 'Oxygen People' who try to help you stay pain free! – Neil Boast, The Les Charlton Award Winner 2017

KING'S COLLEGE LONDON EVENT

OUCH(UK) member, Nick Cooper, attended our meeting at King's College, London, on 21st October, and has written his account of the day:

Bush House was a venue pretty easy for me to get to: just an hour on the train and a short walk across Waterloo Bridge. As usual a very friendly greeting from the OUCH(UK) team, and I purchased Christmas cards and wrist bands. The refreshments were excellent and plentiful, and I found the lecture hall as a venue really good for hearing and seeing the presentations. Mercifully the rooms we used were nice and cool, as hot, stuffy rooms are always a trigger for me.

First, we had presentations from Professor Peter Goadsby. It was really useful scene setting and was full of interesting stats, such as, the average time from first symptoms to diagnosis, and to treatment. Education of GP's still remains a priority. There was encouraging news on the novel treatments and research. Dr Diana Wei's presentation was centred around the previous imaging studies, which showed how cluster headaches activated different parts of the brain compared to migraineous headaches and very much identified the hypothalamus as a key area in this condition. With much better imaging now available, Dr Wei is looking for volunteers for her trial to scan cluster headache patients.

KING'S COLLEGE LONDON EVENT

Dr. Alex Nesbitt gave a fascinating talk on how we sleep and the periods of REM sleep and pre REM sleep during a normal night of sleep. It is clear that cluster headache has a massive effect on quality of sleep and all the beneficial activities that the brain goes through during sleep. Dr. Emer O'Connor's presentation was very enlightening, with some really useful facts and figures showing that there is a definite genetic link with this condition

Next, we saw a presentation from OUCH(UK) trustees. This session just re-affirmed my experience that OUCH(UK) are a great organisation and provide invaluable advice both about the illness itself and around disability claims. We are lucky to have OUCH(UK), and I want to say a big thank you to all. Overall, it was a very worthwhile day with lots of really useful information and brilliantly organised.

CELEBRATING THE LIFE OF CAROLYN MATHESON

We are devastated to inform you that OUCH(UK) hero and dedicated member Carolyn Matheson, passed away suddenly at home on Tuesday 31st October. She was much loved by her family, Ian, Emma and Jade, and will be missed terribly by the headache community. DARREN HAMILTON'S CAMP CLUSTER ADVENTURE #1

In this first instalment of 'Camp Cluster', Darren Hamilton takes us through his experiences of driving over to North Wales in his 'Cluster Bus', camping under the stars, and meeting cluster headache patients on his travels.

I arrived in Llanberis late Saturday, as the sun was setting through the pass. I waited at the top, camera ready, to capture some of the most stunning views – massive sheer mountain walls, weathered and carved by nature over thousands of years. Twisting down the deep valley, I see the golden sunlight through the clouds, slowly drawing across the face of Snowdon. Its mood changing with the colours of the fading light, slate grey to granite, soft browns to purples and reds. The site I set up camp

at was basic, but shared stunning views – the stars were out across the heavens, bordered by two mountains either side – clear skies due to no light pollution. I saw two shooting stars that night, and experienced one cluster headache attack.

On Sunday, my first visitors were Karen and her family. It was great to meet them. We had a good chat and a brew! The rain came in on Monday, but I stayed warm and dry under the tarp. I 'cooked' a can of soup, and burned my bread on the fire, and that evening raised a glass of honey 'Jack' to toast the moment.

Tuesday had arrived, and the sun came back out. Mike and young Jamie turned up, as did Col, as they are local 'CHers'. We went on to Mike's for coffee, and were joined by Dorothy and Dave. We had a great time chatting face to face, rather than by keyboard. Smiles say so much more, like a warm hug. If I can, with this cluster-filled brain, say a big thank you to Col for the demand valve, as it was much appreciated. Our farewells were said, and I headed back to Llanberis and through the pass in the setting sun, for the last time on this Cluster camp trip. I drove with the windows down so I can hear the purr of the engine as we climbed up the snaking, twisting road. The air was damp and cold, but still so fresh, and I tried to savour the last few miles of this stunning beauty, holding on to good memories of the first Camp Cluster!

INTERNATIONAL HEADACHE CONGRESS IN VANCOUVER

The International Headache Congress is a gathering of headache specialists that occurs once every two years. In 2017, the IHC added a new section for the congress - the world's first gathering of patient support groups, to join the headache specialists. The aim was to show recognition to the role of patients in their treatment plan, and equally the role of patient support groups such as OUCH(UK) in giving patients a collective voice. With this in mind, ahead of the conference opening, a day was set aside for the patient advocates to meet with each other, listen to experts in care, and to decide what the first steps of this new global platform were to be.

OUCH (UK) were very pleased to be invited to the event and participated fully alongside our colleagues in the European Headache Alliance (EHA). Trustee Scott Bruce, represented OUCH(UK), ensuring that cluster headache was on the radar of the Patient Forum in a room dominated by Migraine associations and groups.

A question was chaired at one of the discussion sessions about how national governments who use the 'step programme' (the programme of using medications in a certain order usually dependent upon cost) should deal with cluster headache patients whose pain may not respond to many of the treatment options that are on the lower steps. The experts unsurprisingly had no answer other than to look for cluster specific treatments, some of which are being trialled currently. The rest of the congress was a chance to meet with neurologists, trainees and industry professionals who had an interest in headache disorders.

Several young researchers had chosen to study cluster headache and we were presented with some of their research at the conference. One particular Danish study, held in conjunction with the Danish cluster headache group, had notice 'pre attack' indicators. The research has real promise.

Information was also presented about some of the larger trials going ahead in the headache field, the biggest being CGRP trials.

From the first meeting of the patient support group, the International Headache Society intends to build on the significant first steps and to listen more to the patient voice. It was deeply humbling to see just how well known OUCH(UK) is known, not just from our homegrown neurologists, but worldwide. **– Scott Bruce**


Richie Camfield's tattoos - Old School Tattoos in Northumberland by Steve Clark.



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
