

CLUSTER HEADACHE is a rare neurological disorder causing excruciating attacks of pain on one side of the head, centred in and around the eye on the affected side.

Attacks can last 45 minutes to 3 hours (or more) often at the same times of day and night, frequently waking the sufferer from sleep.

Attack symptoms can include some or all of the following:

- Agonising pain in the eye and surrounding area
- Watering of the eye
- Swelling / drooping of the eyelid
- Runny / blocked nostril
- Changes in the pupil of the affected eye
- Sweating / raised temperature
- Extreme restlessness / pacing up and down / rocking backwards and forwards

Treatment for acute attacks - as recommended by NICE:

- Sumatriptan injections or intranasal sumatriptan / zolmitriptan
- Short-burst high-flow 100% oxygen with non-rebreather mask

There are two types of the condition:

EPISODIC Cluster Headache attacks occur in bouts, or clusters, lasting several weeks or months, after which they disappear, sometimes for months or even years.

CHRONIC Cluster Headache sufferers do not get this relief, and their attacks continue daily for years without a break.
